### **General Entry Information**

\* Any one may enter an exhibit in Open Class. \* Each article entered must have been completed since July 2013, and must have been made by the person under whose name the article was entered and not been previously exhibited (excluding foods)

\*There will be a professional class

corresponding to each non-professional class. Judging is separate. The professional class will be designated with a capital "P" behind the class and section number. A professional is one who earns \$1,200.00 or more selling products in the same category that they exhibit in open class.

### \*In the Open Classes, an exhibitor will not be limited in the number of entries in any class, but is limited to 2 entries per section.

\*Displays should be no larger than 30" X 30", width and depth.

\*While we are not placing a height limit, be aware that our exhibit space is limited. \*The Extension Homemaker Fair Exhibit Committee will have supervision of placing of exhibits for show during the Fair.

### **Display Only**

\* The Committee cannot set up an exhibit class for every article brought in. However, they will be glad to have articles brought in for display. Ribbons will be awarded on such displays upon the recommendation of the judge.

### **Date and Time of Entry**

\*<u>Open Class exhibits</u> must be brought in on time. Late exhibits will be barred from competition at the discretion of the Open Class Committee.

\*Exhibits, with the exception of foods, fruits, vegetables and flowers must be brought in Saturday, July 12 from 8:30 am to 11:30 am. Judging is 12:30 pm and is closed to the public. \***Foods** are to be brought in Monday, July 14 from 8:30 am to 11:30 am. Judging is at 12:30 pm and is closed to the public. \***Flowers, Fruits and Vegetables** are to be brought in Thursday, July 17 from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm. Judging will begin at 12:30 pm and is closed to the public. Building will be closed during judging.

### **Exhibit Release**

\*No exhibit is to be removed before the hour of release established by the Board except by special permission of the department superintendent to cover emergencies.

\*Articles will be released on Saturday, July 19 10:00 a.m. \*All exhibitors must check out with the Open Class Committee. \*In no case will the Extension Office or the Extension Homemakers be responsible for the handling of exhibits left in the building after check-out time.

# \*Need a Permission Slip to pick-up another exhibitor's article.

### **General Display Rules**

\*The Open Class Premium List contains notes in various sections. These notes are incorporated as rules, and the guidelines must be followed for the exhibit to be accepted for judging. Those notes include (but are not limited to) the following: recipe cards, labeling, and proper hangers.

### **Foods and Canning Rules**

\*Per State and County regulations: Filling, frostings, glazing, pie filling and meringue – Whether uncooked or cooked – <u>are not permitted</u> to contain cream cheese, whipped cream, unpasteurized milk or eggs/egg whites (pasteurized egg or eggs cooked to 160 degrees F may be used). Home-canned fruit, vegetables, or meats <u>are not permitted</u> in products. Recipes <u>must be</u> <u>provided</u> that show which ingredients were used in each part of the product. Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands <u>do not have</u> open cuts before preparing foods. Whenever possible, baking products should be transported and stored in chilled cooler (41 degrees F).

\*Judges and individuals who consume products from county competitions should be informed that they are at risk for food-borne illness since the established policy <u>cannot</u> guarantee that an entry which is a "potentially hazardous food" has been properly prepared or handled before, during or following the competition.

### Awards

\*Each exhibit in a section, including Professional class, which merits a blue ribbon, will receive one, regardless of the number of entries in the section.

\*A Champion ribbon will be awarded in sections where appropriate, as determined by the judge. \*Champions will be selected from the blue ribbon entries only.

\*One Champion entry in each class will be chosen to receive a Grand Champion ribbon. A Reserve Champion ribbon will be awarded in classes where appropriate, as determined by the judge.

\*Blue and Red ribbons will not be placed on the exhibits. Instead, a sticker will be placed on each exhibit label. This is to keep the exhibit area looking neat, and to keep the exhibits themselves highly visible to the public. Upon check-out, please stop at the table to collect the ribbon for your exhibit.

\*The decisions of the judges are final. \*Decisions made by the Starke County Extension Homemakers and their assigned committees are final.

### Additional Awards Wilton Fair Award Guidelines

One Best of Class award will be given in Open Class Decorated Cakes division (only the decoration is judged). The cake must have some type of bag and tip decorating.
